Assembly of First Nations (AFN): Heroes of Our Time Awards

Application deadline: June 15

Seven memorial awards (as listed below) from the Assembly of First Nations are available to First Nations students who have completed at least one year of postsecondary education. Successful applicants will demonstrate exceptional academic abilities, and be involved in and show a commitment to their First Nation community. Awards are available to students in a variety of disciplines and areas of study. Transcripts and two letters of reference must be included in the application.

Jake Fire Award

For First Nation's students who have completed a least one-year in Criminology and meet the criteria outlined above.

James Gosnell Award

For First Nations students who have completed at least one year in a program of law and meet the criteria outlined above.

Omer Peters Award

For First Nations students who have completed at least one year in Political Science and meet the criteria outlined above.

Robert Smallboy Award

For First Nations students who have completed at least one year in a medical program and meet the criteria outlined above.

Tom Longboat Award

For First Nations students who have demonstrated exceptional athletic abilities and meet the criteria outlined above.

Tommy Prince Award

For First Nations students who have completed at least one year of a Native Studies program and meet the criteria outlined above.

Walter Dieter Award

For First Nations students who have completed at least one year in an accredited social work program and meet the criteria outlined above.

Awarding graduate scholarships valued at **\$10,000** each to support native students enrolled in post-baccalaureate degree or diploma programs at a Canadian university. The educational program of the successful candidates will have special relevance to economic development for native peoples in Canada. Preference will be given on the basis of academic excellence, but work-related experience with potential for initiative and leadership qualities will be taken into account. The subject areas that have direct bearing on economic development will be considered, and the applicability of the course of study to native economic development must be demonstrated.

Eligibility:

Proposals are usually invited from candidates who will;

- a) engage in research culminating in a thesis or other such document
- b) include direct northern field research or experience as part of their studies
- c) whose programs are relevant to northern problems or issues

DEPARTMENT OF INDIAN AFFAIRS POST- SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE

Application Deadline: June 30

Assistance varies according to marital status and number of dependants. First Nations' students should apply to their Band Office or Band Education Coordinator for assistance. Information regarding scholarships and bursaries should also be available in your Band Office. Funding can include cost of tuition, books and supplies, travel and living expenses. Partial funding is also available in certain circumstances.

Apply to your home Band or directly to the Department of Indian Affairs if you are from an out-of province Band that does not handle educational funding. Consult with your college's First Nations Education Coordinator for more information regarding available assistance.

Diana Fowler LeBlanc Aboriginal Social Work Scholarship

Providing opportunities for Aboriginal people interested in pursuing a career in social work, to help ensure that greater numbers of Aboriginal social workers are available to serve within their communities. Mature students are welcome to apply. The jury will take into account relevant work experience.

Established by Mrs. Diana Fowler LeBlanc, this scholarship will provide funding to enable Aboriginal students from all provinces and territories, including First Nations, Inuit and Metis, to pursue a **degree in social work** at recognized Canadian educational institutions. It is intended primarily, but not exclusively, to encourage mature students who wish to obtain a Bachelor of Social Work, and who may already be doing valuable work in their own communities.

In order to ensure Aboriginal students this access to education, Mrs. LeBlanc is challenging Canadian corporations, foundations, families and individuals to give generously to the Aboriginal Social Work Scholarship (ASWS).

The goal of this initiative is to create an endowment fund, the interest of which will be used each year to award scholarships enabling students to undertake a post-secondary program in social work. These scholarships will be available to all Aboriginal students including First Nations Status and Non-status, Metis and Inuit students.

The ASWS is administered by the National Aboriginal Achievement Foundation (NAAF).

The Foundation's established credibility and many past successes will provide the Scholarship with strong administrative support and will ensure that these scholarships assist those most in need. The demand for Aboriginal social workers is high at present, both in urban areas and in isolated communities, and is particularly great within the corrections system, shelters, employment programs, and the fields of health care and family and child welfare.

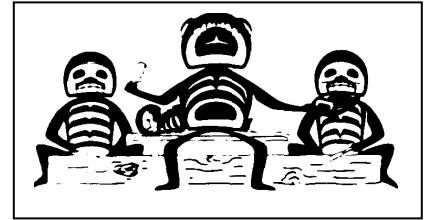

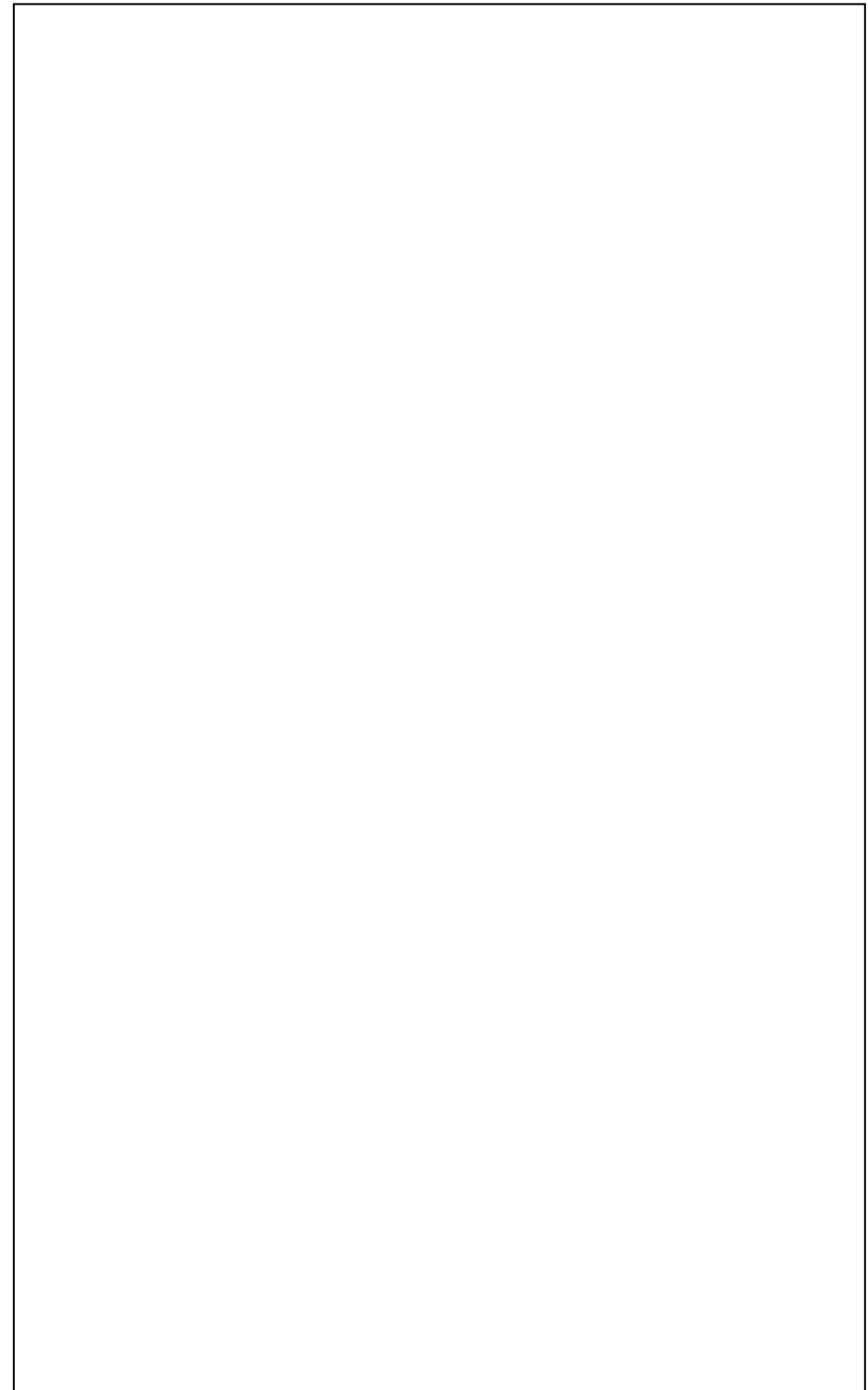
