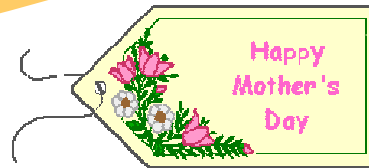

Indigenous UCFV student is awarded Alberta Scholarship

Did you Know...?

Mission resident Jeanette Dillabough, a UCFV Social Work student, is amongst 26 BC students awarded an Alberta scholarship this year.

These annual scholarships, awarded for the first time this year and funded by the Alberta government, are provided to every province and territory in Canada in celebration of Alberta's centennial. Each recipient province or territory determines its own application process and deadline. BC chose to award the \$2005 scholarships to Aboriginal students as a way of helping them start, stay in and succeed in public post-secondary education and training.

A Métis with Cree heritage, Jeanette is originally from Manitoba but lived in Edmonton for ten years. One weekend, she took a trip to BC and never left! This June, she'll cross the UCFV stage at convocation to receive her Bachelor of Social Work degree and an additional certificate in First Nations studies. Jeanette began her studies in 2002, earning her Social Services diploma two years later and then laddering into the degree program. And she's not slowing down now!

"I'd really like to pursue my Master of Social Work next," she says, referring to the community consultation that UCFV recently undertook about introducing such a program. In the meantime, she's working with Triangle Community Resources. She also volunteers her time by sitting on the Mission Community Services board of directors, the Mission Downtown Coalition, and a number of other committees.

Jeanette recently completed her final practicum placement with the Abbotsford Probation Office. "My passion is working with people struggling with substance misuse issues," she says. "For now, I'm focused on getting more experience in my field."

Students must be First Nations, Métis, or Inuit to be considered for the scholarship. They must be enrolled in full-time studies at a public post-secondary institution, provide their educational goals and employment aspirations, and show a need for the funds with their application. Winners are chosen by the British Columbia First Nations co-ordinators committee and a representative from the Ministry of Advanced Education. Interested students should contact the First Nations co-ordinator at their institution this coming December for application details.

That UCFV instructor and Sto:lo community member Gwen Point has won an award from the Aboriginal Tourism Association? Gwen is recognized for her efforts over the years in helping Chilliwack host the Chilliwack Powwow.
