History of Indigenous Peoples in Latin America

Early Summer Session, 2010

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Course Times: Mondays and Wednesdays, 8:30 a.m. – 12:10 p.m.

Course Description: This course explores the history of Andean peoples from the Inka period to the present day. After examining the nature of the Inka state and the polities it subjugated, we will look at the impact of Spanish rule, considering the political, economic, and socio-cultural transformations that occurred in the Andean region. We will pay particular attention to the nature of colonial Andean cultures, the role of intermediaries, the impact of religious change, and the meaning and consequences of the eighteenth-century rebellions. For the nineteenth century, we will analyze the actions of Andean peoples in the creation and development of the nation-state, discussing ethnic divisions and divergent ideas of nationalism. In covering the twentieth and early twenty-first centuries, we will examine a series of interconnected processes and issues, including *indigenismo*, agrarian reform, rural-urban migration, music, the reworking of identities, coca leaf consumption and the traffic in cocaine, political violence, and contemporary Indigenous social movements.

Course Format: Each class there will be an in-depth seminar discussion of the key topics and assigned readings, with the occasional contextual lecture when necessary.
