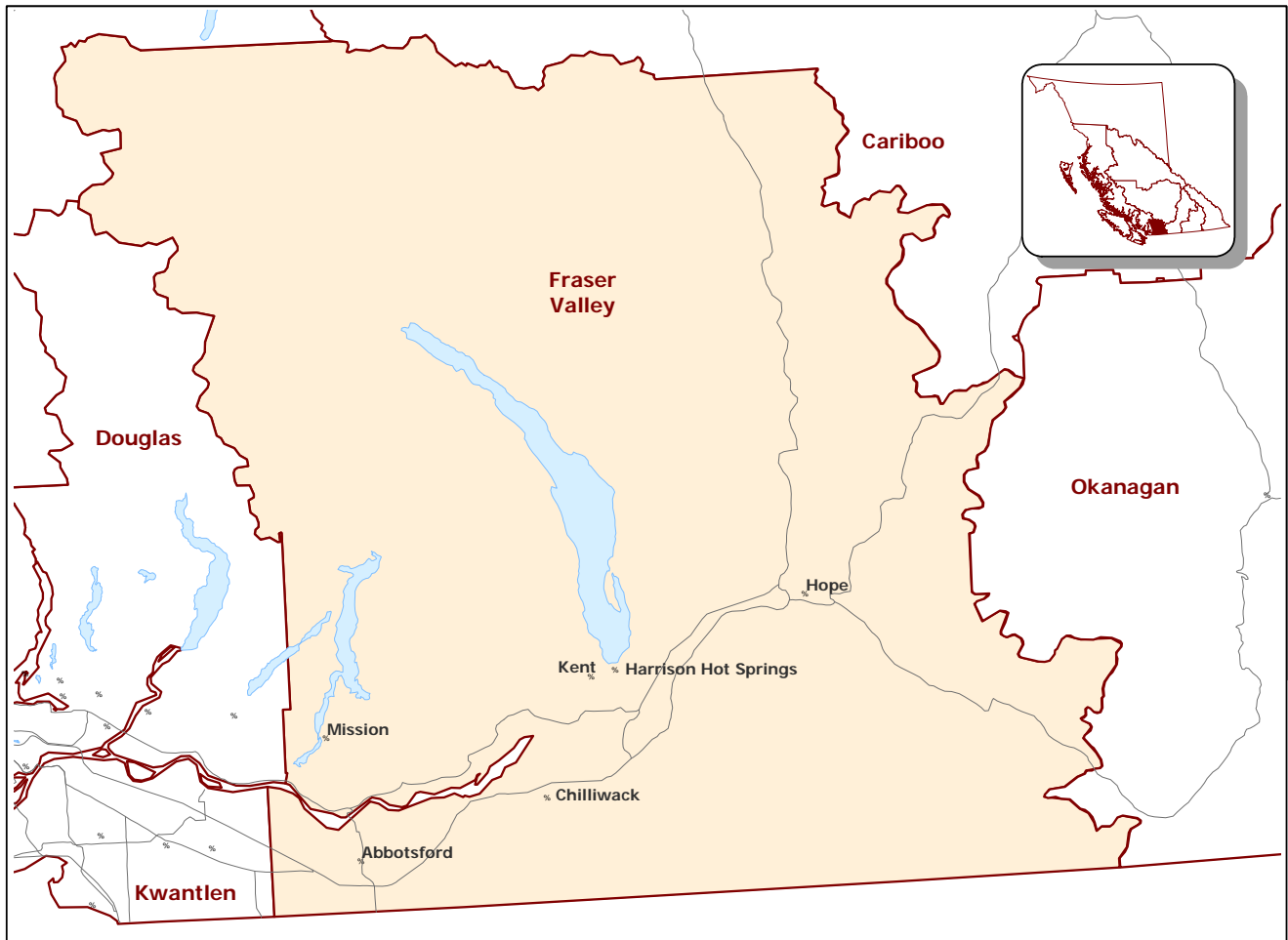

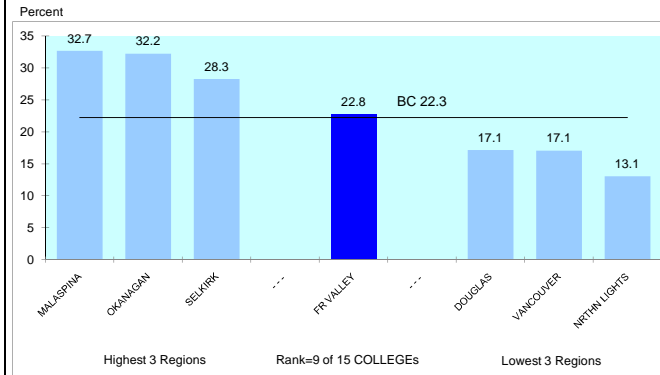

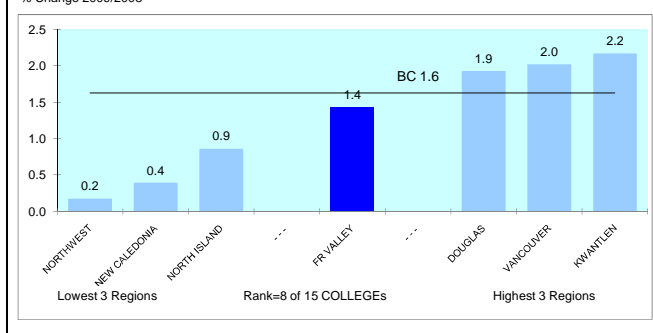
Elderly Dependency Rate - 2009

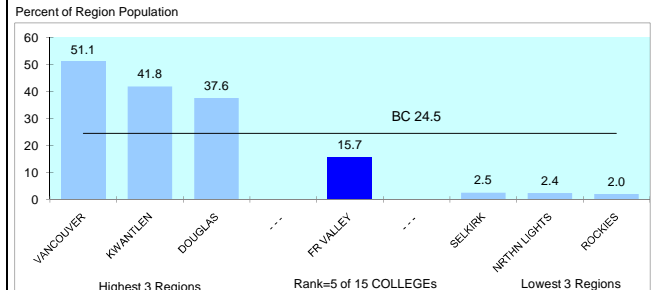

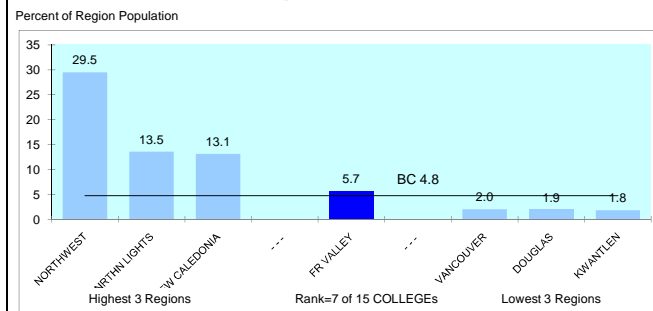

Visible Minority Population - 2006



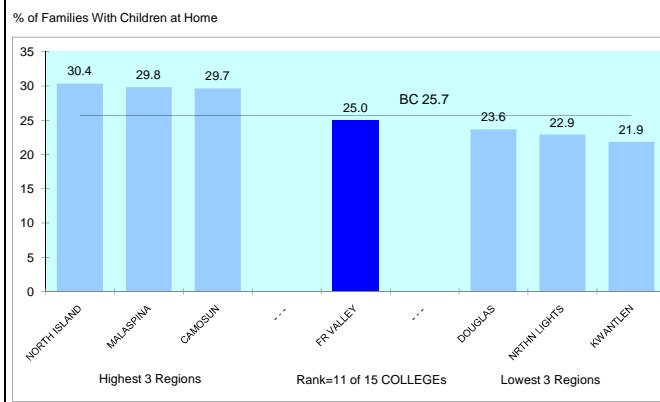
Aboriginal Identity - 2006

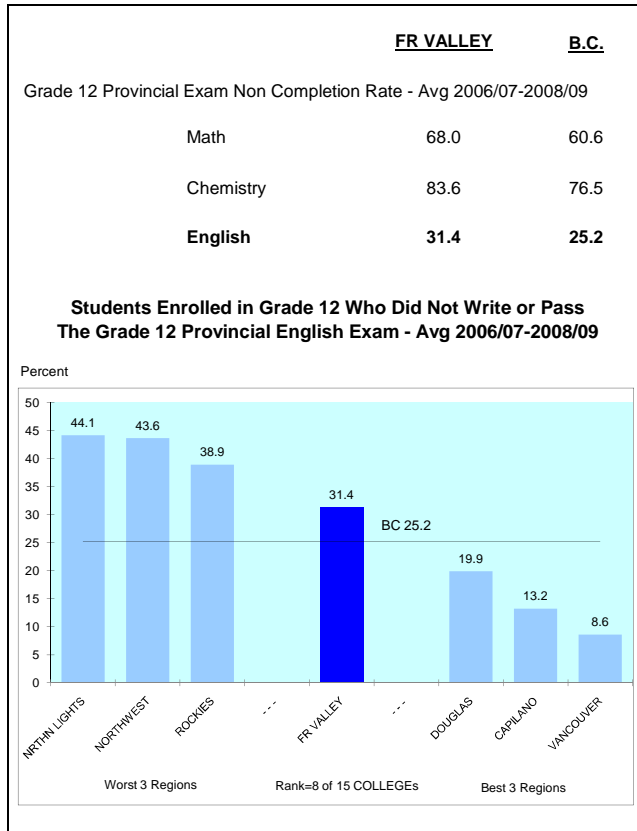

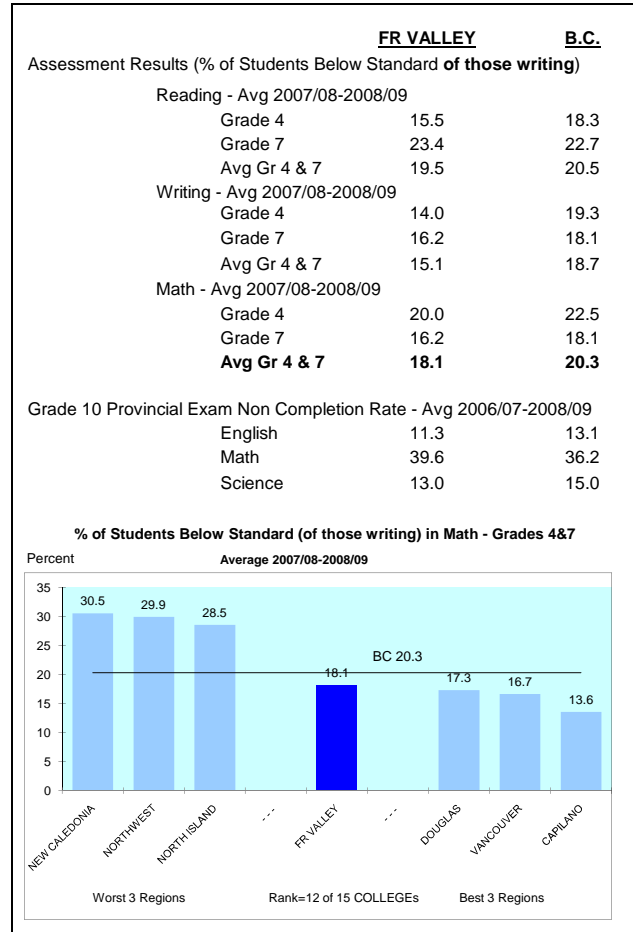

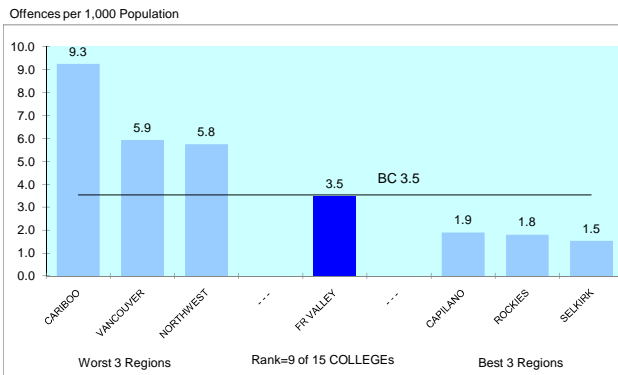

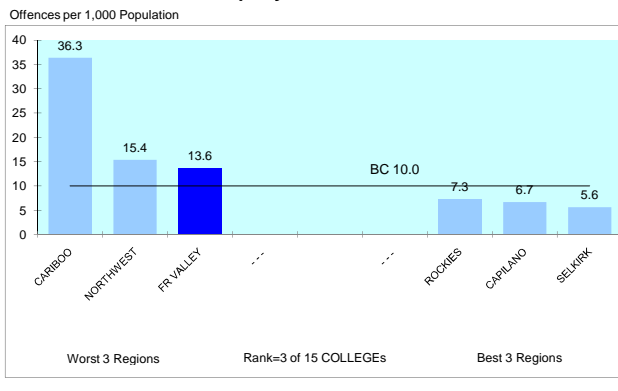

Serious Property Crime Rate - 2006-2008



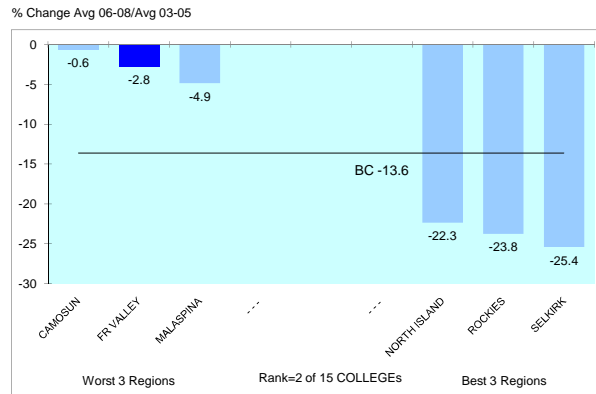

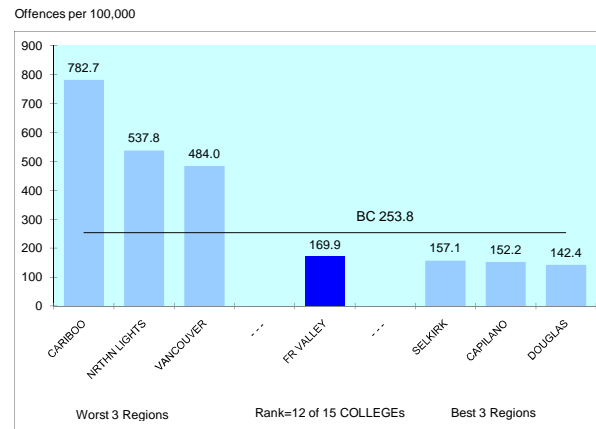
Change in Total Serious Crime Rate

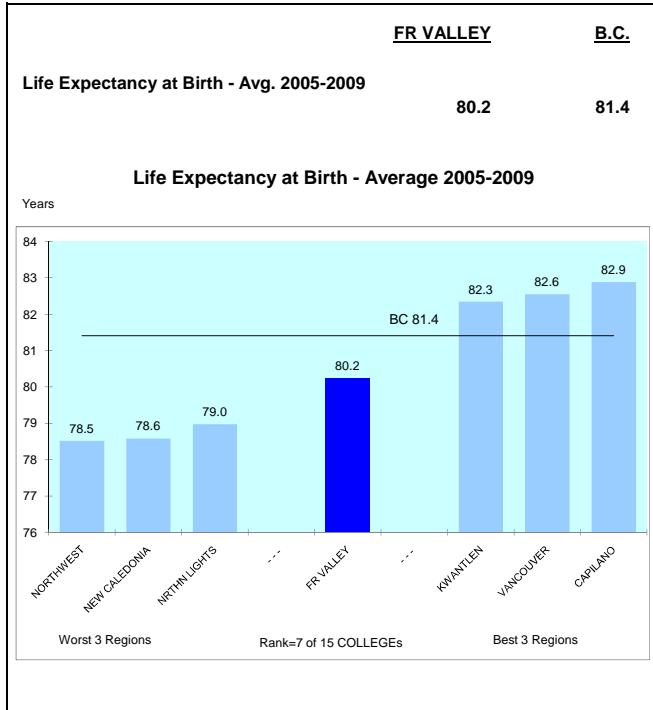
Non-Cannabis Drug Offences - Avg 2006-2008



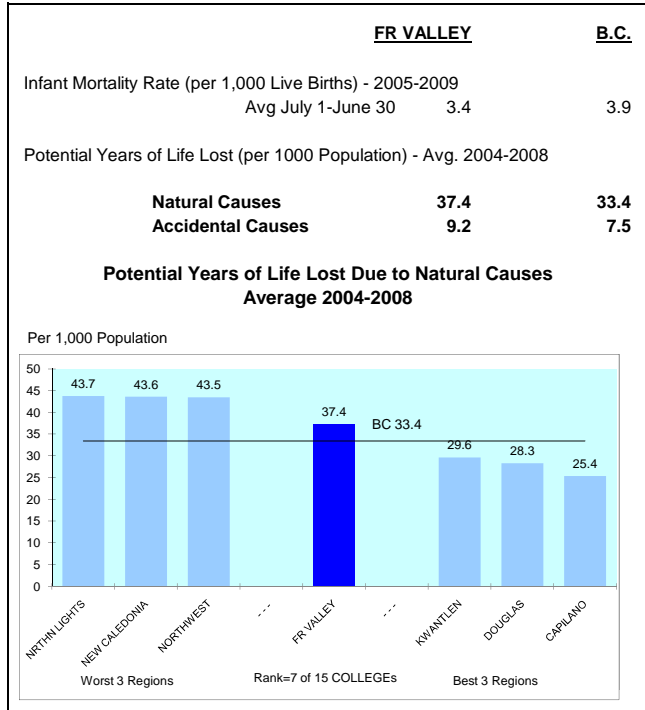

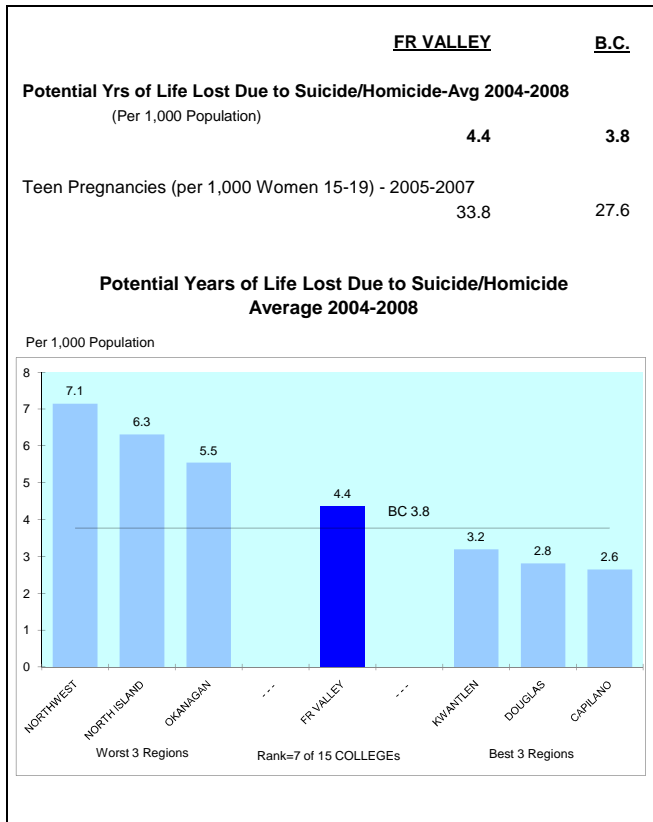

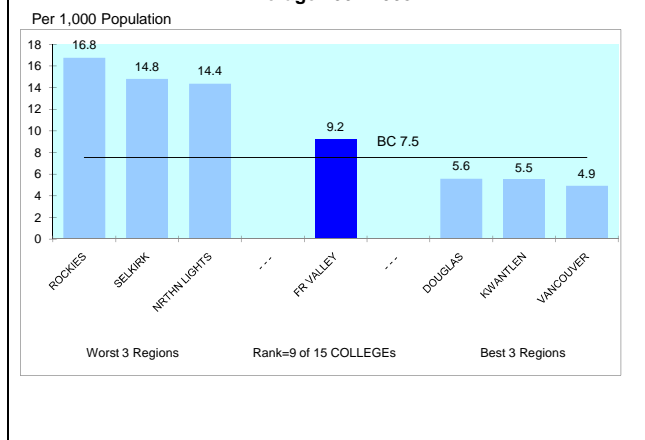
