## Employment:

November 5, 2007 – Present

**Regional Manager of Community Relations and Training; Parole Board of Canada.** I am responsible for managing the Communications Section staffed by 8 Regional Communications officers and 2 support staff. This section provides information to victims, the media and the general public within the parameters of the law and policy. Related to this function is my role as spokesperson to the media for the Board in the Pacific Region. Importantly, I am responsible for organizing and delivering induction and ongoing training for Board Members. I also have a role in assisting the RVC in assisting Board Members meet ongoing learning objectives to enhance their functioning as decision makers. I serve as the

Board's representative on both the Regional Ethno-cultural Advisory Committee and the Victims Advisory Council. In these capacities I am involved in the development of policy responses to the recommendations provided by these groups. With my colleagues across the country, I am involved in national issues related to training, service to victims and communications and outreach.

November, 1997 – November 2007

**Full-time Board Member; Parole Board of Canada:** I am responsible for making conditional release decisions for men and women serving sentences in federal penitentiaries. Board members are also responsible for reviewing appeals for denied or revoked pardons. These tasks involve assessing the risk of individual offenders by examining police, court and correctional records, evaluating progress in rehabilitation, conducting hearings with offenders, family members and victims, evaluating release plans and applying the laws and regulations governing conditional release in Canada. Each decision is written as a formal document, which is subject to public scrutiny. This is an Order-In-Council Appointment of the federal government. As a disproportionate number of federal offenders are aboriginal, I have had extensive training in First Nations' cultural and spiritual practices, participated in prairie and west coast traditional ceremonies and worked with several elders to further develop my understanding of First Nations history and culture.

May, 2005 – Present

**Sessional Instructor: School of Social Work; University of the Fraser Valley**

As a Sessional Instructor I have taught courses in Social Policy, Substance Misuse and Family Centred Social Work Practice at the first, second, third and fourth year levels respectively.

August, 1998- Present

**Instructor/Program Developer:** Kwantlen University College: I developed a certificate program entitled Community Mental Health Support Worker Program and taught in this, and the Community Support Worker Program. I developed curriculum, instructed students, supervised practica and liaison with community agencies in the fields of developmental disability and mental health. Specific courses taught included: Interpersonal Communication Skills, Introduction to Practice in Community Mental Health, Wellness, Helping Skills, Recovery and rehabilitation, and Human Development Across the Life Span.

September, 1991- July, 1993

**Division Chair; College of New Caledonia:** I was responsible for the administration and supervision of faculty and staff of the Social Services Diploma

programs, the Early Childhood Education Program, Resident Care Attendant Program, Programs for students with developmental disabilities and the distant education program for Developmental Disabilities Worker Program. I was also responsible for First Nations student services. I prepared and developed budgets, supported professional development activities, initiated community and continuing education projects, liaison with other colleges and universities, worked with Band Councils, Friendship Centres and the local Tribal Council to develop services and improve access for First Nations students and provided academic leadership to the college community.

March, 1989 - September, 1991 and from July, 1993-July, 1994

**Instructor/Program Developer; Social Services Program; College of New Caledonia:** Duties included development of programs and curricula in the area of social services, instruction of students, liaison with community agencies and supervision of students on practica. Specific courses taught included: Interpersonal Communication Skills, Public Speaking, Chemical Dependency, Social Policy, Educational Policy, Introduction to Disabling Conditions, Helping Skills, Helping Theories, and Introductory Psychology.

January, 1990 - December, 1997

**Private Practice Therapist (part-time):** Under contract with the Forensic Psychiatric Services Commission, provided individual, group and family counseling services to men convicted of sexual offences. I also organized and delivered intensive retreat programs for First Nations men from remote reserve communities, ran a group for non-offending parents, maintained client records and liaised with probation, child protection and parole services.

August, 1986-March 1988

**Social Worker/Team Leader; Nechako Centre; Prince George Regional Hospital:** Duties included program development, supervision of staff, liaison with community agencies and group and individual counseling of people with chemical dependencies within the context of a residential treatment program. I also had the opportunity to work with a team of First Nations counselors in the delivery of an intensive substance abuse program offered onsite in Reserve communities. I participated as consultant-counselor-supervisor for two of these programs. In addition, I had the primary role in the development of an Employee Assistance Program for a major pulp and paper mill in the community of Prince George.

December, 1985-July, 1986

**Instructor; Arctic College Social Services Program, Fort Smith NWT:** Duties included the development of curricula, instruction of First Nations, Inuit and non-native students in a certificate and diploma program in the area of social services

training. I also provided academic and personal counseling to students, and supervised practica throughout the Northwest Territories and Yukon.

September, 1984-December, 1985

**Psychiatric Social Worker; High River Mental Health Centre:** Provided individual, group and family counseling services to a broad range of people in the community. I also provided direct services to people with mental illnesses and their family members. I conducted assessments, developed and implemented treatment plans and maintained client records. Liaison with community agencies of all types was an important feature of this position.

March, 1981-September, 1984

**Director and Psychiatric Social Worker; Prince George Mental Health Centre:** Provided individual, group and family counseling services to a broad range of people in the community. **Child and Youth Worker; North Okanagan Youth Resources Society, Vernon, British Columbia:** Individual and group counseling with children with behavioral and emotional problems in a residential treatment centre. Support services to families were also provided.
