#### **Course Objective**

The overall purpose / rationale for this course is to design, conduct, and submit an original piece of research based on a student's interests. Students work with a supervisory committee composed of two members of the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice to complete a thesis. The focus of the course is on introducing and framing a research problem, conducting a literature review related to the thesis topic, and collecting and analyzing data in order to present findings, make recommendations, and draw conclusions. Following completion of the thesis, students will defend their work before an examination committee consisting of the supervisory committee and an external examiner.
