CRIM 799

Course Objective

The overall purpose/rationale for this course is to design, conduct, and submit an original piece of research based on a student's interests. The focus is on introducing and framing a research problem, conducting a literature review related to the thesis topic, and collecting and analyzing data in order to present findings, make recommendations, and draw conclusions. Following completion of the thesis, students will defend their work before an examination committee consisting of the supervisory committee and an external examiner.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Articulate an issue of concern in the field of criminology or criminal justice.
- Conduct a comprehensive literature review.
- Critically evaluate an issue of concern in the fields of criminology or criminal justice.
- Develop appropriate research methods to address an issue of concern in the field of criminology or criminal justice.
- Complete and receive institutional research ethics approval, if required.
- Collect and analyze data to examine an issue of concern in the field of criminology or criminal justice.
- Interpret and discuss limitations of data.
- Make recommendations on an issue of concern in the field of criminology or criminal justice.
- Orally defend their research and conclusions about an issue of concern in the fields of criminology or criminal justice that withstands the scrutiny of the academic community.

Sample Instructional Methods

(e.g., face to face instruction, online collaborative, online self-directed, experiential, student led learning, group collaboration, etc.).

Students will work independently and demonstrate that they have mastered their ability to write a thesis by obtaining approval for their work from their supervisors and an external examiner. The student's supervisors will provide reviews and suggestions at every stage of the research.
