Course Objective

The overall purpose/rationale for this course is for students to gain clinical experience working directly with children, youth and families in a health care environment; to meet the requirements to be certified as a Child Life Specialist.

- 1. Display knowledge and skills specific to child life
- Apply academic learning in the health care setting by completing assessments, plans, interventions and evaluation/follow-up with children, youth and families
- 3. Demonstrate a high degree of initiative and independence practice during the internship, identifying areas for continued professional development
- 4. Utilize strong interpersonal and leadership skills to motivate and support children, youth and families
- 5. Advocate and initiate change in the health care environment to support children, youth and families experiencing challenging situations
- 6. Take responsibility for their actions with children, youth, families and other embers of the health care environment, in the context of the Child life Code of Professional Practice

Typical Instructional Methods (guest lecturers, presentations, online instruction, field trips, etc.; may vary at department's discretion)

The internship follows a situational leadership model where students begin with high direction and support from the CCLS field supervisor, as opportunities to engage in child life practice and take on increasing independence and responsibility are provided in a clinical setting. Structured learning modules describe specific tasks, and are utilized by the intern, clinical supervisor and faculty liaison, to guide the learning process. Feedback is provided to the student with opportunities to reflect on practice and debrief interventions and outcomes.
