OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course, the student will:

- Feel more comfortable in expressing himself/herself in spoken English i. ii.
 - Have competence in writing accurate short sentences and paragraphs according to his/her ability
- iii. Read material at an appropriate level with good understanding.

METHODS:

This will be an active and interactive class where students learn by practising English in the skill areas of writing, reading, speaking and listening independently, in pairs or in groups as best suits the learning situation. The students will use their texts for in-class study and homework. The teacher will utilise supplementary materials such as videos, newspapers and interactive exercises to enhance the learning situation.

STUDENT EVALUATION PROCEDURE:

Teacher observation and regular tests on material covered. Credit or non credit at the end of the course will be determined by a 75% result on test material and 25% on in-class participation, attendance and demonstrated progress.

COURSE CONTENT

Content will be adjusted to suit the needs of the students and so may vary slightly from one semester to another. All skill areas of speaking, listening, reading, writing, and grammar will be covered. One text will be used over two semesters so that students may return to the class for an additional semester and continue to learn. In addition, an alternate text will be used the following year in order to give the opportunity to those students who may wish to continue over a third and further semester.
