- Reviewing syntax from URH Certificate Proficiency
- Reviewing and expanding on phonology and semantics of URH
- Reviewing and expanding various sentence structures in various contexts whilst applying interlinear glossing
- Using learned syntax to create written sample sentences.
- Creating short personal paragraphs of daily living.
- Practicing the syntax shift between first, second, and third person.
- Practicing conversational dialogue for daily activities.
- Social-cultural connections to land and people
