- Comprehend the traditional story-telling forms in the Halq'eméylem language, including discourse markers, story structure, and formal elements (e.g. Introductions, closings, and quotative marking).
- Correctly use the structural foundation of Sxwoxwiyam (origin stories) and Sqweqwel (current events) and their rhetorical devices such as metaphor, repetition, etc.
- Demonstrate advanced knowledge of the Stó:lō worldview (meta-awareness and metacognition).
- Use literary devices such as stanzas in an oral presentation of a short story.
- Use proper protocol, copyright and publishing rights for materials.
- Listen to, view, and read creative works with visual and contextual support.
