- To be able to differentiate how the Upriver Halq'eméylem language is influenced by social and cultural settings.
- To advance one's technological knowledge and skills of how to develop and implement second language acquisition within the Upriver Halq'eméylem language.

- To increase oral proficiency to initiate and engage in advanced level of conversation.
- To increase oral proficiency to initiate and engage in providing and following advanced level instructions.
- Read, analyze, and discuss advanced short literary texts in the Upriver Halq'eméylem language.
- Hands-on experience in developing second language acquisition Upriver Halq'eméylem resources using technology.

Module 1: Weeks 1-5

Part A: Oral Communication and conversation

Examine, analyze, and discuss scholarly works in Upriver Halq'eméylem.

Practice and demonstrate expansion of oral proficiency.

Part B: Hands-on experience with technology focusing on written aspects of second language acquisition with emphasis on Upriver Halq'eméylem language.

Module 2: Weeks 6-10

Part A: Oral comprehension of following and delivering various types of instruction.

Repetition of everyday phrases and expressions and to initiate and engage in daily oral conversation.

Part B: Hands-on experience with technology focusing on speaking aspects of second language acquisition with emphasis on Upriver Halq'eméylem language.

Module 3: Weeks 11-14

Part A: Understanding of how the Upriver Halq'eméylem language changes within various Stó:lō social and cultural contexts.

Group discussions on ways the Stó:lō express their language and worldview.

Part B: Hands-on experience with technology focusing on the auditory and visual aspects of second language acquisition with emphasis on Upriver Halq'eméylem language.
