COURSE DESCRIPTIVE TITLE		

**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**

This course will introduce students to major themes and new approaches in the history of gender and sexuality. We will examine the changing constructions of masculinity and femininity in the United States, from the colonial era to the late twentieth century. More specifically, we will look at how prescribed social and cultural norms have shaped definitions of acceptable behaviour in areas as diverse as politics, work, family and sexuality; how these norms have changed over time; and how men and women of different classes, races, ethnicity and sexual orientation have responded to these norms.

**PREREQUISITES:** Nine credits of lower-level history, which must include one of HIST 241 or HIST 242.

Note: As of September 2008 the prerequisites will change to the following:  
HIST 241 or HIST 242, six additional credits of lower-level history, and four credits of 300-level history.
