- 10. Correctly use accusative case forms to express destination and direct objects

## **Typical Course Content and Topics**

Week One: Introduction to the Russian alphabet, names and health

Week Two: alphabet, numbers, seasons and weather

Week Three: present tense of "a-stem" verbs, gender, numbers, days of the week

Week Four: parts of the body, possessive and demonstrative adjectives, adverbial expressions of time

Week Five: descriptive adjectives, months of the year, ordinal numbers, the irregular verb ЖИТЬ

Week Six: locative case of nouns, adjectives and pronouns

Week Seven: verbs in -ать and -ить, locative case

Week Eight: Imperfective past, irregular verbs MO4b and XOTETb

Week Nine: genitive case of nouns, adjectives and pronouns Week Ten: review of possession and "to have" vs "to have not" Week Eleven: accusative case of nouns, adjectives and pronouns

Week Twelve: verbs of motion, destination and direct objects

Week Thirteen: accusative expressions of time, abstract vs concrete verbs of motion
