- Reflect on rehearsal process and performances, demonstrating self-awareness

Details (if necessary): Assignments may include: script analysis (10%), character research (10%), rehearsal journal (10%), and reflection paper (10%); Project includes the student's actual execution of the role (physical and vocal dexterity), ability to respond to feedback by revising performance, development of complex character in performance; Participation includes effective collaboration with peers, professional and respectful behavior, participation in all rehearsals, additional workshops as required by production, tech and dress rehearsals, and set strike.

Typical Course Content and Topics

Rehearsal (6-8 weeks): research, script analysis, workshops, rehearsals

Tech (2-3 weeks): cueing sessions, costume parade, tech rehearsals, dress rehearsals, previews)

Performance (2 weeks): 6-10 public performances

Post-production (1 week): set strike and reflection on what was learned
