Lectures, seminars, readings and appropriate theatre visits are part of the course. Essays and an examination are required for university-transfer credit. English 230 is occasionally offered in Ashland, Ore.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To foster students' understanding of English drama in its historical context; to give students knowledge of the major movements, forms, genres, and dramatists which have shaped English drama.
- 2. To enhance students' ability to read, analyse and write about drama.

METHODS:

Combined lecture/class discussion; group presentation of a scene; at least one attendance at a live performance; some videos of plays as appropriate.

STUDENT EVALUATION PROCEDURE:

Grades are based on written work (two papers, one review of a live performance), class discussion, and a final exam.
