COURSE CONTENT

The nineteenth century was a period of unprecedented economic and social change in Britain. The novel, as it developed under the Bronte sisters, Jane Austen, and George Eliot, described these changes not as they were recorded in Parliament, but as they were inscribed on the personal lives of the people around them, and particularly on the lives of women. Issues of land and power, class and individuality, personal and public identity drive these authors' voices as they develop the medium to express their concerns.
