Under the example of "American Renaissance", the course will focus on the period 1840 – 1855, during which American writers established a distinctive national literature.

Melville – Moby Dick and selected letters

Whitman - Preface to Leaves of Grass, "Song of Myself," and selected shorter poems

Margaret Fuller – selected essays

Fredrick Douglass, Narrative of the Life of Fredrick Douglass, an American Slave

Dickinson – selected poems
