- 6. Write literary analysis using appropriate scholarly conventions and research methods.

- 8. Apply knowledge of relevant social and historical contexts to course materials.
- 9. Conduct guided research and synthesize secondary sources in written and oral work.
- 10. Recognize and apply critical frames to literary analysis.
- 11. Analyze personal responses to literature, and demonstrate understanding of how literature evokes affective responses.
