CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course will examine literatures of South Asian diaspora from Canada, Britain, Australia, the United States, and elsewhere. An overview of the South Asian diasporic (migratory) movements—both colonial and postcolonial—will provide the historical, socio-cultural, political, and/or economical context to understand the selected literary texts, including novels, plays, poetry, and/or autobiography. Topics for discussion may include home and homeland, nation, migration, identity and belonging, race and racism, empire and colonialism, and movements and restrictions, among others.
