LEARNING OBJECTIVES / GOALS / OUTCOMES/ LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. To review traditional and recent approaches to the study of historical geography.
2. To explore and critically evaluate the evidence and data available for studies in historical geography.
3. To examine the use and value of historical research in landscape and ecological studies in geography.
4. To investigate heritage conservation as a theme in applied historical geography.
5. To contemplate past work and possibilities for research in the historical geography of religion.
6. To have students complete a major fieldwork project, culminating in a significant piece of local historical geography.

METHODS:

The majority of the course time will be devoted to the presentation of new material in lecture and discussion format, but significant time will be allocated for group and individual archival research instruction as well as for actual fieldwork. Students will devote the bulk of their study time to reviewing studies in historical geography and their project preparation time to finding, evaluating and using historical information. This is very much a field oriented course.
