Quick Bits

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MLA formatting is a way to cite sources of information both within your text and on a separate references page at the end of the document. The following is based on the MLA Handbook, 9th Edition, and shows rules for various source types and situations.

Basic MLA Format for Works Cited:

Author(s) . "Title of Source." *Title of Container*, Publisher, Year.

Author(s). = Lastname, Firstname. After the first author, all other authors are listed as "Firstname Lastname" For instance, it will read as "Lastname1, Firstname1, and Firstname2 Lastname2."

"Title of Source." = The title of the smaller source (i.e. a chapter of a book, a single article in a journal, a web page's title). If citing a whole book, journal, website, or anything of the like, skip this element and move to the next one.

***Title of Container*,** = The title of the whole source (i.e. a whole book, an entire journal, the name of a website).

Publisher, = The organization responsible for the release of the source to the public. This can include book publishers, film studios, theatre companies, and others.

Year. = The latest year the source was published. If you have a link to an online source, instead end this element with a comma and a space and put the link in immediately after. Then, put a period after the link with a space and say "Accessed" with the most recent date you accessed the source on (i.e. "Accessed 10 Oct. 2010").

In all cases, pay close attention to punctuation, capitalization, spacing, and italicization.
