The <u>online academic calendar</u> is the official source for information about the General Studies diploma and other courses and programs of study offered at the University of the Fraser Valley.

- Program information is found under "Select Area of Study..." tab, from entrance requirements to graduation requirements for selected program. GS diploma requirements are listed under General Studies.
- Course information is found under "Select Courses ..." tab, including number of credits, prerequisites, and an overview of course content.

Academic Calendar www.ufv.ca/calendar/current



- Tab provide more specific details about courses. The course syllabus given out on the first day of class includes information taken from here. This can also be submitted to another post-secondary institution as part of the transfer credit evaluation process.
- The information found in **MyGRADplan** has been taken from the current Academic Calendar this is our official legal document. If there is a discrepancy between the two sources, the current Academic Calendar is the one in effect.

GS diploma Program Requirements



This diploma requires completion of a minimum of **60** credits.* This is approximately 20 classes.

Within the required 60 credits, there are specific program requirements. (See myGRADplan).

 IMPORTANT NOTE: the GS diploma does not require completion of these credits/courses within a specific timeframe.

Your pace of completion is based on your personal schedule and goals. It needs to work for you.

Core Competencies



As part of the General Studies diploma, you will demonstrate competency in three areas:

- 1. Effective Communication
- 2. Use and Interpretation of Numerical Data
- 3. Digital or Scientific Competency

GS diploma Program Requirements



GPA

- GPA stands for Grade Point Average.
- To remain in Good Academic Standing, students must maintain:
 - A 2.0 cumulative grade point average (CGPA) to remain in good academic standing.
 - Students who do not maintain a 2.0 CGPA may have restrictions on their account and may be required to withdraw from UFV, as per UFV's Continuance Policy.

GS diploma Program Requirements



So how do you know which courses to take?

- You will find the official program outline in the current Academic Calendar.
- You can also find your personal program plan in MyGRADplan accessed via myUFV.

MyGRADplan



MyGRADplan can help you assess:

- Your program progress (how many courses/credits left?)
- Which classes transferred with me when I came to UFV?

As a UFV student, you can log into this program 24/7 so that you <u>always</u> have access to your program plan. It is accessible via your myUFV account, and is reviewed during your Academic Advising appointments. Please keep in mind it does NOT replace appointments.

MyGRADplan



Here's how to login:

- 1. Login to myUFV using your usual credentials.
- 2. Locate the MyGRADplan channel on the myUFV landing page
- 3. Follow prompts to access myGRADplan.

- Under the <u>Registration</u> area you'll find information about the registration process at UFV.
- The **Fall 2021 timetable** is located under the <u>"View</u> timetables" box.



- The interactive course finder under the "<u>Use the course</u> finder" box can be used to review course options by discipline, specific course number, seats available (waitlists) and other options. You can also build a sample weekly timetable with this tool.
- The <u>"Dates and deadlines"</u> box is where you will find all the published registration deadlines including: withdrawal dates, fee payment deadline, and statutory holidays when UFV is closed.

Sample First Semester



Here is an example of what a typical Fall semester might look like.

The choice is yours! Take courses that interest you and that could lead to your ideal career or ladder onto a bachelor's degree.

Fall (Sept - Dec)

Choose 3 to 4 courses from the following list to include one of ENGL 105 or CMNS 125:

- 1. One or Two General Education Requirements (ENGL 105 or CMNS 125 to be included)
- One or Two Personal interest elective(s) (100-200 level)
- Academic skills course (i.e. UNIV 101 or CSM 108)

Course Load Balance



How many courses you take each semester is up to you. **Consider your workload carefully** to find a balance between your school, work and personal life.

Our recommendation, and what most first year diploma students take, is 3 or 4 courses to start. That equates to approximately 9 - 12 hours per week in class.

Expect to spend <u>at least</u> that same amount of time per week for homework (readings, assignments, group work, etc.).

Course:

A unit of instruction that is offered under a designated subject code, course number, and credit value; for example, ANTH 102 (3 credits).

Credit:

A numeric value assigned to a course, based on both the hours of direct instruction and the coursework done outside of the classroom, which indicates the course's weight relative to other courses.

Prerequisite:

A requirement such as a previous course, a specified number of course credits, or other academic skills, knowledge, or achievements that must be completed prior to enrolling in a particular course.

Co-requisite:

A course that is to be taken at the same time as another course.



Lower-level:

Courses that are considered first or second-year courses and are numbered 100–299.

Upper-level:

Courses that are considered third or fourth-year and are numbered from 300–499.

Preparatory level:

Courses considered developmental or preparatory to post-secondary studies. Course numbers will start with a 0 and will not be used to satisfy program requirements.



Elective:

A course that may be chosen from a number of course options, as specified in the requirements for completion of a particular program. For the GS diploma, any UFV course numbered 100-level or higher chosen based on interest in content, satisfy course prerequisites, and fits with schedule of courses already chosen.

Full-time Studies:

Enrolment in nine credits per semester (considered 60% of a standard course load).

Grade Point Average (GPA):

Academic performance expressed as a numerical average of grades in UFV courses. GPA values are truncated at two decimal places, not rounded.

Tuition:

Amount of money assigned to a course Based on the number of credits assigned. This increases once a year starting with the Summer semester.



Summer semester:

Full - courses are scheduled May to August.

Early - courses are scheduled May and June.

Late - courses are scheduled July and August.

Registration period occurs in March.

Fall semester:

Courses are scheduled September to December.

Registration period occurs in June.

Winter semester:

Courses are scheduled January to April.

Registration period occurs in November.
