
The University of the Fraser Valley is situated on the traditional territory of the Stó:lō peoples.

What Is QS?



Qualifying Studies (QS)

- QS is a first step in your educational journey
- QS allows you to take classes while you work toward your goal program
- In almost all cases, the classes you take in QS will be used for credit in your goal program



Which Courses?



You can take <u>any course</u> you meet the pre-requisite for.

You can also take upgrading courses.

Suggestions for Fall 2021:

- Upgrading or other courses to meet entry requirements
- Build a strong writing foundation
- 100-level classes in subjects you like
- Core classes from your goal program
- An introductory course like UNIV 101





What About Workload? UNIVERSITY FRASER VALLEY



Online classes require more independent study

Courses can be worth 3, 4, or 5 credits. That's approximately the number of hours you'll be in class per week.

For every hour you spend in class, plan for 1-2 hours of homework and research

3 hours in class + 6 hours homework + commute time

Budget about 10 hours per week for each 3 credit class

What About Workload? University Fraser Valley

If it's your first semester of university, consider taking a lighter course load. Don't get overwhelmed!

To be considered "full time" you would take 9 credits per semester.

If you want to graduate with a degree in four years, you will take 15 credits every Fall and 15 credits every Winter.

You can speed up or "catch up" in Summer semester if you want to.



University: What to Expect University

- Very little time in-class to work on assignments
- You choose your own schedule based on when courses are offered
- You need to reach out for support
- You are responsible for your education & choices
- You can explore topics that weren't available in high school




MyGRADplan

Winter 2021 Example

Registration dates*		
Oct 30	Registration time available through myUFV.	
Nov 16	Registration begins You cannot register or waitlist without meeting prerequisites. You can register or waitlist if prerequisite courses are in progress at UFV.	
Dec 21	Deadline to cancel classes under regular circumstances.	
Jan 12	Last day to register for courses using myUFV.	
Jan 13	Instructor's permission required to register in a course.	
Jan 8, noon	Deadline to log in to online courses.	
Jan 21	Fee payment deadline. Penalties apply if fees not paid in full.	
Jan 22	\$20 registration fee per course in effect. Pay full fees to add a course.	
Feb 5	Last day to register to audit a course.	
Feb 6	Dept. Head permission required to add a course.

Withdrawal dates*	
Jan 5	Last day to drop courses and get 100% refund.
Jan 6 - 13	5% of tuition withheld for any dropped courses or sections.
Jan 14-21	10% of tuition withheld for any dropped courses or sections.

You can check your registration date and time on your MyUFV account

Domestic students pay the \$200 registration deposit at least 72 hours before your registration date. International students have a different payment and deposit schedule. Check with the International department for details.
