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Alberta Centennial Scholarship—Awarded to Michelle Julian

Michelle is an Aboriginal 4th year Social Work student. Not only is she a hard working academic, she has worked for Aboriginal Access Services and has done a research assistant placement for Gwen Point as well.

Michelle, as many of you know, is Sto:lo and former Chief of the Matsqui First Nation.

Michelle's Own Story

I attended my first year at FVC (Fraser Valley College) in 1991 then returned to UCFV in 2005 after a 14 year break....well not really a 'break'....I was working and raising my 2 incredible children. After they graduated from high school, I felt it was 'my turn' and now I'm at UFV in my 4th year of the Bachelor of Social Work degree.

The last 3 years as a full time student has certainly presented its share of challenges. The first of which, was going to university as a 'mature' student, among many other students who are the same age and younger than my own children! The second challenge came quickly when I realized that being a full time student demanded even more time, energy and work than any full time job I had ever held. And the third challenge presented itself as I entered the final year of my degree....seeing the light at the end of the tunnel but realizing my financial savings were quickly becoming depleted.

I received an email from Shirley Hardman at the Aboriginal Access Services Coordinator regarding the Alberta Centennial Scholarship - it instantly caught my attention. I had never applied for scholarships before, as I always felt someone needed it more than I did, but this year was different and I completed the application.

The scholarship is sponsored by Alberta in celebration of their 2005 Centennial. Beginning in 2006 the generous Alberta government distributed 25 \$2005 scholarships to each Province. Our beautiful Province of B.C. decided that all scholarships would be distributed among Aboriginal university students. The selection criteria were based on a number of factors including: (1) financial need; (2) GPA; (3) previous contributions to Aboriginal communities; and (4) future plans & goals directed to continued support for Aboriginal peoples. I was ecstatic when I found out I had been chosen as the UFV recipient and I will be using the money to help cover my living expenses until I'm done in December 2008.

After I get my degree I plan to return to work and save more money, so I can pursue my Masters at either SFU or UBC. My long term goal is to open my own Clinical Counselling practice, serving Aboriginal peoples who need some support in achieving their dreams, too.

National Aboriginal Day Awareness at UFV: Mini Powwow on June 17

National Aboriginal Day celebrates the unique heritage, cultures, and contributions of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people in Canada. UFV is celebrating the occasion with a mini powwow. Aboriginal Access Services celebrated with our 4th Annual Mini Powwow on Tuesday, June 17 on the lawns of its Abbotsford campus (33844 King Rd.).

Organized by the university's Aboriginal Access Services, this free event invited the public as well as faculty, staff and students. The day featured dancers in full regalia, drummers, story-tellers, and a \$5 barbeque lunch (burgers and bannock). Artisans from across the lower mainland were onsite to showcase and sell their work, including tapestries, jewelry, capes, smoked salmon, carvings, and dolls.

UFV celebrated a bit early. June 21 is the day selected as annual National Aboriginal Day because it corresponds to the summer solstice, the longest day of the year, and because for generations, many Aboriginal groups have celebrated their culture and heritage at this time of year.

"This is UFV's fourth annual mini powwow," notes Shirley Hardman, Aboriginal Access Coordinator. "We hope to create an awareness of National Aboriginal Day, which is one of four days that the federal government has designated to celebrate Canada. For Aboriginal peoples, the declaration of the day (in 1996) has been seen as a response to a call that came in 1982 for a National Aboriginal Solidarity Day."

The event, by all accounts, was a roaring success. President Skip Bassford welcomed everyone to the celebration and Mary Sandoval (Chawathil) thanked our ancestors for the beautiful day. The Blackfish Drum Group led by Chief Chris Thomas made certain that the dancers were able to honour their regalia and please the audience with their gifts of dance. A real treat for everyone was Will Visser who performed a solo grass dance - not once but twice. Another special treat was a performance by Urban Indian Productions.

Watch for next year's mini powwow scheduled for the Tuesday following UFV's Convocation ceremonies!

Opt Out Option

If you're already covered by an equivalent health and dental plan (such as a parent or spouse's employee benefit plan, or a plan provided by your band council or through Health Canada), you can **OPT OUT**. The British Columbia Medical Services Plan (MSP) doesn't provide coverage equivalent to the SUS Health & Dental Plan. Students can't opt out if they're covered only by MSP.
