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NITEP thinks "Get back to Chilliwack"

Long since established as an important part of the regional First Nations educational landscape, the Native Indian Teacher Education Program began to set its roots as a UBC mainstay in 1974. NITEP served as part of a vanguard for increasing First Nations participation and success in post secondary education. NITEP is still a major part of the First Nations education scene today.

There was a Chilliwack NITEP centre for many years and many First Nation students went on to professional careers in education or other fields. After a six or seven year absence, NITEP may well have a presence again on the UCFV's Chilliwack campus. If there is enough interest to enrol indicated, NITEP will return to Chilliwack.

Many students have spent up to two years in Chilliwack in teacher training. Although students from many first nations studied at the centre, many students will be recognizable as Sto:lo

people or as xwelmexw living in Sto:lo territory. As well during the time of NITEP being here, many students began post secondary study through the program before deciding to move into another field. Whether as teachers or in someother professional role, people with NITEP training have made



many valuable contributions to many communities. Many former NITEP students have become educational, cultural or political leaders for aboriginal communities.

Sto:lo scholar Dr. Joann Archibald is the Acting NITEP Director as well as the Associate Dean of Indigenous Education. With her extensive association with aboriginal post-secondary education in general and with NITEP specifically, Dr. Archibald has been in discussion with UCFV's Aboriginal Access Services and the Aboriginal Community Council for over a year to bring NITEP back to Chilliwack. NITEP originally began a Chilliwack centre at Coqualeetza in 1977. After a brief hiatus, NITEP re-opened a centre on the Chilliwack UCFV campus in 1985. The centre remained open until 2000. This year may be significant for the return of NITEP to UCFV Chilliwack. Aboriginal Access Services looks forward to welcoming NITEP in the near future.

UCFV visual arts student Heather Nairn recently had artwork included in a show at the UCFV gallery on the Abbotsford Campus. Her creation entitled 'Thunderbird' is based on a Nuxalk dance mask representing a being called 'thunder'. The dance

continues to be one of most important for the Nuxalk.

Nairn used plaster and twigs to make 'Thunderbird'. The whole figure is whitewashed. For at least one Nuxalk observer, this piece is rife with messages about the impacts of colonialism on Nuxalk people.
