Three new team members

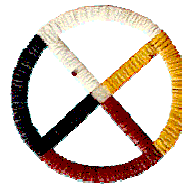
S'olh Shxwlèlì is proud to welcome three people to our staff. We are excited to see our team grow by so many quality people at once.

SFU Forum - Master's of Indigenous Education

On Thursday the 26th of July, I attended a forum with faculty from Simon Fraser University about a two-year Master's of Education in Indigenous Education. It was a very exciting meeting between the faculty and prospective students. What makes this program particularly wonderful is that persons working in education at any level who do not have a Bachelor's degree may apply to the program as a non-traditional applicant. Admittance into the program as a non-traditional applicant is based upon previous education, professional development and career experience. The community-based Master's of Education programs have accepted non-traditional students in every cohort. So, apply if you have extensive experience in education.

The proposed start date for the program is Spring 2008 and the application start date is September 15, 2007 with all submissions to be entered by November 30, 2007. There is an application checklist and package available at the Abbotsford Aboriginal Access Centre in Room A221.

Some of the crucial parts of the application checklist are the letter of intent, writing sample, three current confidential letters of reference and a resume. The letter of intent consists of approximately 500 words explaining why you wish to pursue graduate work in Indigenous education. The writing sample is an example of an argumentative essay of about 4-5 pages double-spaced. Your resume should highlight your experience.

Please pick up an information package if you are interested. Good luck to all who apply and I encourage you that if you are interested to apply as they need 15 students to proceed with the program.
