SUBJECT: Senate Provost's Report

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COVID-19 Updates

On March 16, 2020, UFV announced that it was suspending classes for the duration of the week to enable faculty members time to transition to complete the remainder of the term remotely in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. What followed was a two-year roller-coaster journey of working together to support our students and each other through some of the most challenging periods of our history.

Fast-forward two years later and consider the following data (as of March 7, 2022)

As we approach the two-year anniversary of the WHO declaring a global pandemic, I encourage all of us to reflect upon the devastating impact COVID-19 has had on individuals, communities, and society. Every person has been impacted. The pandemic has also exposed many systemic inequities within and across communities that existed well before the start of the pandemic. It is why prioritizing the continuation of educational activities throughout the pandemic has been at the forefront of UFV, the Provincial Government, and the Public Health Officer's response. Ensuring that educational activities can continue despite the obstacles created by the pandemic has ensured that vital scholarly activities and learnings can continue to advance our knowledge as a society and continue to redress systemic barriers faced by many. The evidence-based approach to the pandemic adopted early by Dr. Bonnie Henry and her team has also highlighted the critical importance that research and scholarly activity plays to solutions when dealing with major societal issues. I applaud the entire UFV community for their perseverance throughout pandemic and commitment and dedication to fulfilling our mandate each day.

Strategic Enrolment Management Plan

To support the implementation of the Integrated Strategic Plan, UFV is undergoing a renewal of its Strategic Enrolment Management Plan. A series of institutional focus groups following the results of the survey and consultations to date are also planned for the week of March 21st and I encourage everyone to participate at a time that is available to you.

Global Refugee Crisis

At the time of writing this report, the United Nations has reported that more than 1.5 million refugees have fled Ukraine and the civilian death count and causalities continues to increase exponentially each day following the invasion of Russian forces three weeks ago. These refugees join the 82.4 million people who were also forcibly displaced around the world in 2020 according to the United Nations Refugee Agency (UNHRC) from countries such as Syria, Venezuela, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Ethiopia, and Myanmar. These numbers and the images and harrowing stories that accompany them are daunting, tragic, and overwhelming.

Within our integrated strategic plan, I am reminded of two of our strategic imperatives around Building Community that state:

- Create opportunities for the world to positively interact with the Fraser Valley and for the Fraser Valley to positively interact with the world
- Build programs that educate our students to act as ethical and engaged global citizens who redress historical injustices

Both imperatives speak to the importance of education to support peaceful societies and direct us to continually do the hard work that is necessary as part of peace and reconciliation. This work is not something that only happens during times of crisis. Rather this is work that needs to take place each day and not taken for granted. As a gathering place for learners, leaders, and seekers, I encourage all of us as active members of an educational institution to continually reflect upon the important role we can all play as free global citizens to actively support those facing injustices and displacement now and, in the days, weeks, months and years ahead.

To align my report with the Integrated Strategic Plan, I have reorganized the activities across the Academic Units under the Mission and Goals of Engaging Learners, Transforming Lives, and Building Communities. Thank you to all those who contributed to providing these updates from the Faculties and Academic Units.

Provide inclusive learning environments for everyone

- FATS is working in collaboration with Seabird Island High school to offer an Explore Trades program via Industry Services. A site visit was held on February 16th, 2022, and further steps to explore this endeavour are continuing.
- Dr. Jason Brandenburg's research on blueberry supplementation on health and performance was highlighted in the National Nutrition Toolkit resource manual created by the USHBC
- Kevin deWolde held a field school information session on January 31st. The 2022 field school, study aboard opportunities, and the new International Business Major and Minor were discussed. Over 40 students have expressed interest in these types of international opportunities, over 30 students attended the information session, and over 20 people have signed up for more information on the 2022 field school.
- Registration for the Fraser Valley Regional Science Fair https://www.ufv.ca/science-fair/ is now open. We are preparing for an in-person science fair to be held on April 7 at UFV. Dr. Ian Affleck, Caroline Majeau and Janice Nagtegaal from the Office of the Dean have been busy confirming award sponsorship and connecting with schools in the Fraser Valley. We are happy to report that all our award sponsors and students are thrilled to be back after a 2-year hiatus due to the pandemic.
- Dr. Geetanjali Gill, Assistant Professor in Global Development Studies, and Alicia Dyck, UFV alum, are featured in a <u>Globe and Mail article by Susanne Martin</u>, published on February 25, 2022. The article profiles Dr. Gill's on-going projects, including the 'Leave No One Behind' project in Sierra Leone, and the role of Alicia Dyck, a student researcher funded by the Career Launcher program at Colleges and Institutes Canada.
- GDS student, Zain Zaidi, and UFV alum, Alicia Dyck wrote a <u>blog article for the BC Council for International Cooperation</u> about the current impacts of climate change.
- In the face of COVID 19, UNESCO has developed a publication titled *ResiliArt 100*, based on 100 recommendations for cultural policymakers that emerged from the ResiliArt project. SoCA Assistant Professor Aimée Henny Brown was chosen to be quoted in this publication, which accompanies one of the 100 recommendations to humanize the policy. The publication will also be transformed into an international open-source virtual exhibition.
- Adapted by Anna Griffith and Heather Robertson, and directed by Anna Griffith, the UFV Theatre department is excited to announce its upcoming production, Pericles by William Shakespeare.
- The Communications Department incorporated the Career Story Hacks contest into their
 professional communication course, CMNS 125, to facilitate students' participation in this workintegrated learning opportunity. Four current students from Dr. Sumin Fang's classes received
 prizes: Elias Dau, Ty Tran, Dhruv Patel, and Harjot Singh. The department would like to extend our
 congratulations to the instructor and students.

- Anti-racism Panel: On January 20, 2022, the Teacher Education Department hosted a virtual panel entitled Anti-racism in/and Education. The panel was comprised of six diverse educators from the Fraser Valley who shared their wisdom with our pre-service teachers. Panelists were asked to share personal and/or professional experiences, how antiracism can be taught/supported/embedded in schools, what it means to be an antiracist educator, and/or a call to action for future teachers. The participating educators included classroom teachers, district-level support teachers, administrators, and superintendents from three of our partner districts (Abbotsford, Chilliwack, and Fraser-Cascade).
